Apple Crisp

IN A MUG



Fall is slowly approaching; the weather's changing, the leaves are falling, and holidays are right around the corner. Like big fluffy bears, we are crawling into our dens for hibernation. When you come stumbling in from the cold, spare some time, not taste, and make a comforting apple crisp-in a mug!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 medium apple, peeled, cored, and diced
- 1 tablespoon granulated sugar
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon, separated
- ¼ teaspoon nutmeg (optional)
- 1 tablespoon water or apple juice
- 2 tablespoons rolled oats
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon butter, cold and diced
- Whipped cream or ice cream

① A IS FOR APPLES

Chop up your apples, and place them at the bottom of your most adorable microwave safe mug.

② ADD A COAT

Add the sugar, half of the cinnamon, nutmeg if you would like, water or apple juice, stirring until the apples are fully coated.

③ 'ROUND WE GO

Put the mug with the apples inside into the microwave for 1-2 minutes to soften the apples.

④ FOR THE CRISP

While the apples are getting nice and warm, in a separate bowl combine the rolled oats, brown sugar, and the rest of the cinnamon.

⑤ THEN THE CRISP!

Add your butter to your rolled oats mixture, pressing them in with a fork or your hand until it becomes a crumbly consistency.

⑥ TOP IT

Then, sprinkle the oat topping evenly over your cooked apples.

⑦ ROUND AGAIN

Return the mug to the microwave and heat it on high for another 1-1.5 minutes. You want the topping to be bubbly, golden, and a tiny bit crispy.

⑧ COOL OFF

Carefully take your mug out the microwave and let it cool.

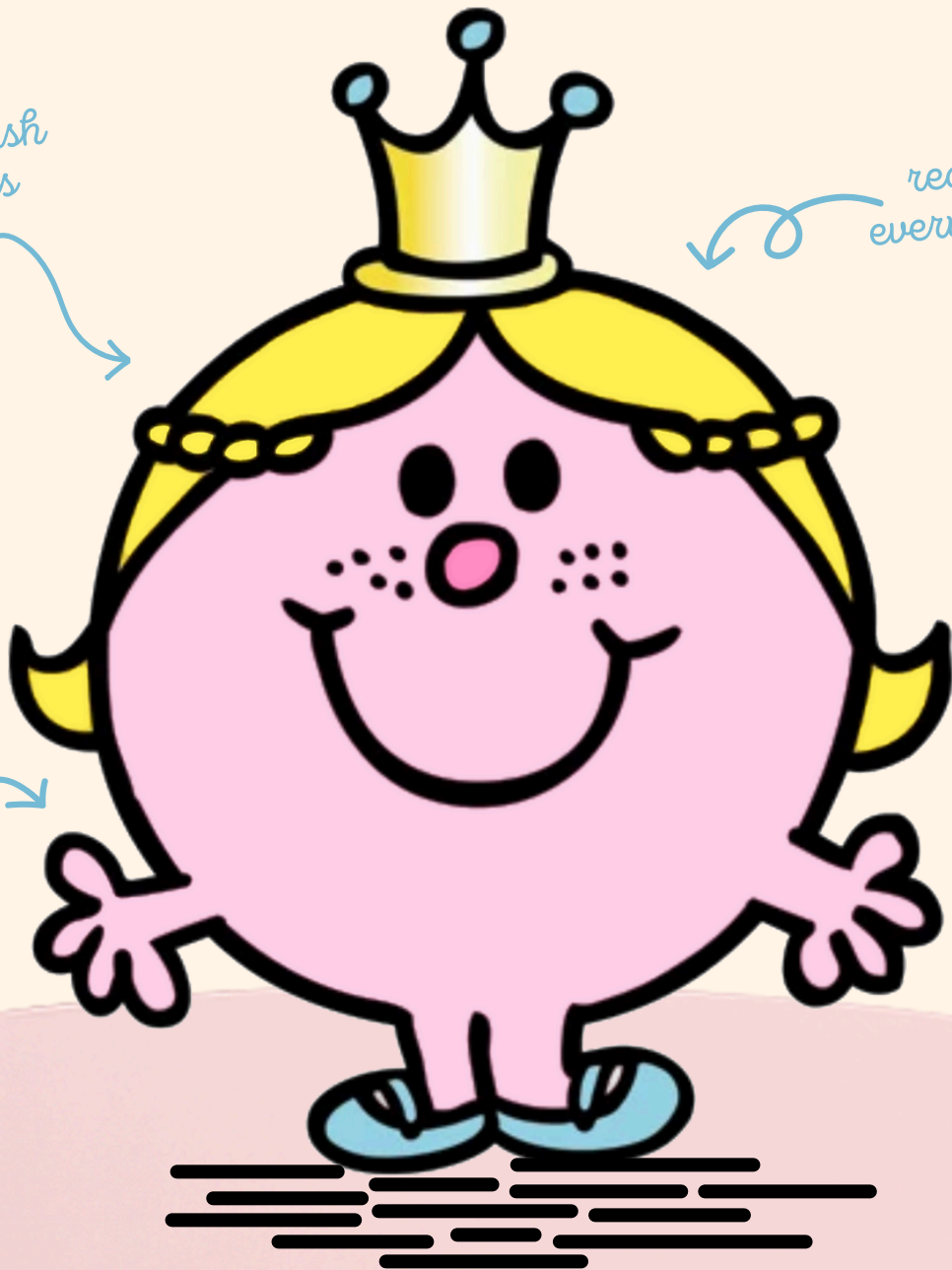

LITTLE MISS PAGEANT PREP

Becoming the Miss Job's Daughter in any jurisdiction is one of the highest honors that a Job's Daughter can receive. It is a display of hard work and dedication that members put into our Order. **The Miss Job's Daughter Pageant consists of four parts: a written test, personal interview, Ritual competition, and a final on-stage question.** The girl with the overall highest score is then crowned as the new Miss Job's Daughter. While specific requirements vary by jurisdiction, the age range to compete is 16-20. **While at first this process may seem daunting, with the proper preparation it is the opportunity of a lifetime and can lead to growth in confidence, leadership, and knowledge of Job's Daughters for everyone who participates.**

Test content also varies based on jurisdiction. **Material can come from the Ritual, Manual of Rules and Regulations, and the duties of the Miss as according to the jurisdiction's bylaws.** Supreme Rules and Regulations can be found on the JDI website. You can access your jurisdiction's Manual of Rules and Regulations under the resources page of their website, or you can ask your Bethel Guardian to help you get a printed copy.



While studying for the pageant test can look different for everyone, there are a few strategies that you can implement to achieve success. When reading the Ritual, be sure to **read ALL of the instructions on floorwork, procedures for meetings, and the diagrams in the back!** As you read along, make flashcards for information that could be made into a test question. As you are reading the Rules and Regulations, highlight important details and translate it onto flashcards or on an online study service! This strategy ensures that you can retain the material by quizzing yourself as often as possible.



The next component of the pageant competition is Ritual. While it varies based on jurisdiction, three messengers are chosen as options for the contestants to memorize, and the one that you do on the day of pageant is selected by random draw. If you are unsure which offices have been chosen, contact the Miss or pageant director to receive the correct information! When memorizing Ritual, **read over the entire passage and then break it down sentence by sentence.**

Read the first sentence aloud, say it five times, and then say it from memory without reading the Ritual. Once that sentence is memorized, say the next one five times, and then say the first sentence and that one from memory, and so on for the entire passage.



Interview and final question work hand-in-hand with one another! Look up sample interview questions, as well as questions that concern your opinions and experiences with Job's Daughters, and major events in our organization today. Write out any ideas for answers that you have in a document so that you have ideas for what you want to say when said questions are asked out loud, whether during an interview or while onstage. Next, reach out to past Misses and ask them to meet in person or over a video call to practice interviews and to offer their feedback and advice in order for you to implement it and improve! When preparing for possible interview and final questions,

Knowing these things about yourself will help you shape your interview answers and platform for running.

Overall, remember that being a contestant in the pageant is an accomplishment in and of itself no matter what. It is a testament to the love and hard work that you have poured into Job's Daughters and you should be proud of how far you have come since you first joined. **Pour that love and excitement into your preparation so that you are poised to take on whatever comes your way at Pageant!**

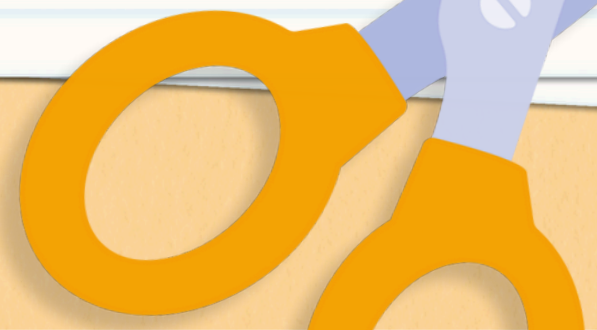


Besides being an icon of the 2000s, the theme invited us to take a journey not only to the south of Brazil but also within ourselves, to find the princess that lives inside each of us.

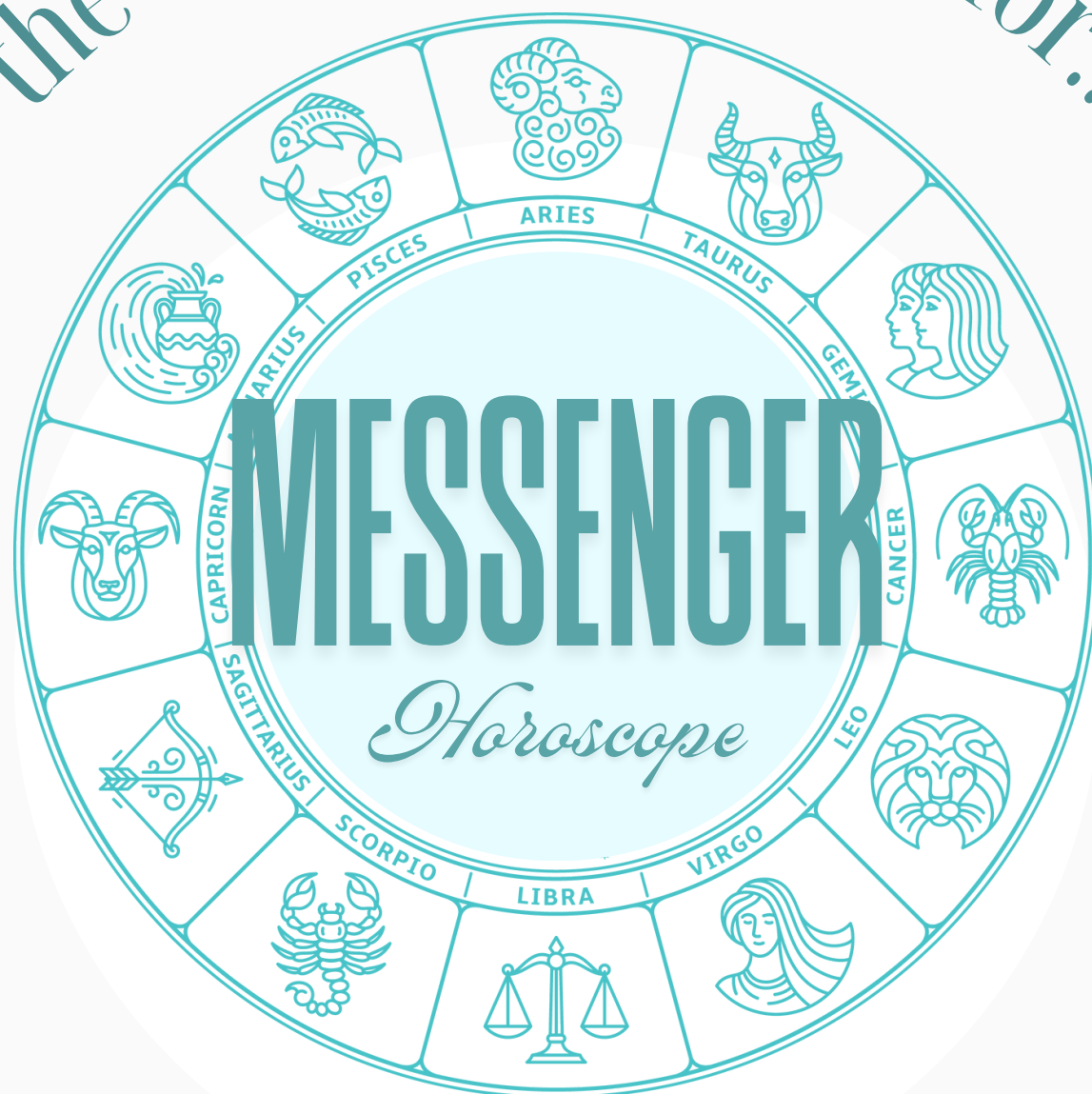

Proficiency.



Pass your proficiency presentation. Before you can start on anything, you have to pass your proficiency examination to be allowed to run for line offices. Most members will pass it by their second year, because it is the same information you learn in the welcome ceremony. Although most of the work is not in the ritual, you can ask your guardian director of epochs or your Bethel Guardian for the specific memorization pieces. You can also ask your bethel sisters for guidance and help in memorizing and understanding the parts.

Plan.

Plan when you want to run. Having a plan of when you want to run for line is the second step in starting your leadership journey. Going through the line takes about 2 and a half years, assuming you enter at the bottom of a full line as Marshal. It is best to plan when you want to assume the responsibilities of an Honored Queen, such as leading the bethel meetings and executing activities, so you can manage your time inside and outside of Job's effectively. You can talk to your bethel council members when they think it is a good time for you to run, and ask your bethel sisters for advice on how to work through elections. Such as how to approach your bethel guardian about running, how to stand during elections, and what to say.



Election.

Elections. Elections can be stressful, nerve-wracking, crazy, and everything else in between! However, it is best to approach it with a calm and level attitude. You have to remember that it is okay to lose, and that it is okay to win as well. What matters most is that you handle a win or a loss with equal grace. Take it from someone who lost their first election running for Marshal, it will be ok no matter the outcome. Just remember: it should never be taken in a negative light, as it gives you an opportunity to take more time and work with your sisters more on how you can thrive and be the best leader they know you can be.

Some tips for you!

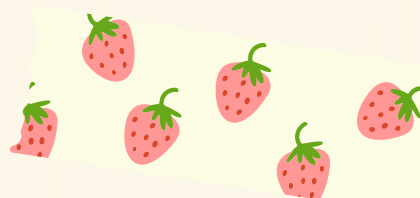
If another sister is running against you, remember to check in with them as well! They might be just as nervous as you!

Don't be afraid to reach out to past or current Honored Queens of your bethel! They have firsthand experience on how to lead the bethel!

Ask your sisters what they would like to see during your term! It will help give you ideas of what the girls are expecting from your term!

You're elected! Now what?

First off, let's celebrate! Being elected is such an exciting moment because you are on your way to becoming an excellent leader. Its time to get more serious. Although Marshal is known as the 'baby of the line,' you still play an important role in the bethel. You start to learn how to take care of the bethel properties, set up the bethel room you will one day preside over, and lead others to care for them as well. As you progress further in the line, you start to learn how to lead in different and unique ways. Being in charge of walking formations as Guide or leading welcome ceremony Epochs as the Princesses are important parts of being a line officer, each giving you a new opportunity for skill building. Remember, as you assume each position up the line, you are still working and learning with your sisters, just in different ways. Each position offers chances to learn, grow, and change, so keep your heart and mind open to each station's new opportunities and lessons.



Term Planning.

Term Planning. The fun part! Term planning looks different at every Bethel, but the idea of organizing and carrying out events is incredibly important when you want to be a leader. I like to think about planning by station. As Marshal and Guide, you are still learning and starting to become a leader. Use this time to talk to your sisters and see what activities they want. Are there favorite fundraisers? Maybe they want to start a new tradition? Remember, this is everyone's Bethel, not just yours. When you assume the stations of Junior and Senior Princess, you should start assembling things into place. Coming up with a message you want your girls to embody and incorporate all terms, fundraisers, and fun events. Mystery trips are always fun in Bethels, and working with local businesses can be fun and unique ways to incorporate charity work. This time is best used to make a calendar and make your plans and ideas official. However, it is best to do events for the good of your Bethel and your sisters.

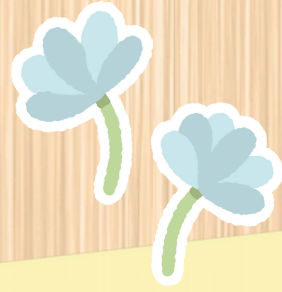
